

EUROPEAN STUDENT LIVING MONITOR 2024 REVEALS KEY CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN FRENCH STUDENT HOUSING

Paris and Montpellier, September 17, 2024 – The Class Foundation's 2024 Student Living Monitor (SLM) has revealed important insights into the state of student housing across Europe, with specific focus on key European markets for higher education, including France. The survey, which gathered responses from nearly 11,000 students across the continent, highlights the varying impacts of living conditions on student well-being, emphasising the need for targeted improvements.

Key Highlights from the Survey

The 2024 SLM report provides a comprehensive overview of the student housing landscape in Europe, revealing an average Mental Health Index (MHI-5) score of 57.8 among students, which is slightly below the benchmark of 60 indicating good mental health. This score is largely influenced by the experiences of specific disadvantaged groups, including students with disabilities, non-binary students, and those facing financial hardships. The report explores four key areas: Availability and Choice, Services and Facilities, Living and Community, and Targeted Support, offering detailed insights into both achievements and areas needing attention.

Country Highlight: Insights on France

The survey included 315 responses from students in France, shedding light on the current state of student well-being in the country:

- <u>Happiness Index</u>: The average MHI-5 score for students in France is 58.7, which is slightly above the European average. However, this score indicates there is room for improvement, particularly in addressing the needs of vulnerable student groups.
- <u>Accommodation Challenges:</u> Only 67% of students in France were able to secure their preferred accommodation, compared to the EU average of 75%. Of those who missed out, 57% cited unavailability as the primary reason, highlighting the need for greater availability and choice in student housing.
- <u>Impactful Facilities</u>: French students emphasised the positive impact of amenities such as gyms, social areas (including games rooms and community kitchens), and shared outdoor spaces on their living experience. Practical services like cleaning of personal rooms and common areas, as well as parcel delivery facilities, were also highly valued by students.
- <u>Areas for Improvement:</u> Despite these positives, there is a significant opportunity to enhance the availability of key resources such as professional mental health support

and career guidance, as more than 50% of students in France currently do not have access to these essential services.
